winter energy payment ends soon

winter energy payment ends on 1 october 2025

Winter Energy Payment is currently being paid to young people to help them pay their heating costs over the winter period. It is automatically paid along with their regular payments.

How the final payments work

- Young people will get their last full Winter Energy Payment in the week starting 29 September.
- They'll get a part Winter Energy Payment (3 day's worth) in the week starting 6 October.
- Young persons first payment without Winter Energy Payment will be in the week starting 13 October 2025.

Use the <u>Check what you might get tool</u> and complete a <u>Full and Correct Entitlement</u> <u>check</u> to ensure young people are getting the correct payments.

commemorate suffrage day, support taiohi to enrol

young people can enrol to vote from 17 – they'll be set up to vote once they turn 18

131 years ago, Aotearoa New Zealand became the first self-governing country where women were given the right to vote.

Only 58% of young people aged 18-24 in New Zealand are enrolled to vote, which is significantly less than the 89% in the general population. This means that young people's voice isn't being heard proportionally in elections.

Commemorate Suffrage Day tomorrow by supporting taiohi to enrol to vote.

They'll need to:

- be aged 17 or older
- be a NZ citizen or permanent resident
- have lived in NZ for more than 12 months.

What young people are saying



change incoming: new obligation failure art process

from 1 october we'll have new obligation failure tasks

We've heard you – the obligation failure process in ART needed improvement.

From 1 October 2025 there will be some changes to make the process easier for youth coaches and YSSU.

What's changing

New tasks

These have questions for the information to process obligation failures and recompliance in the MSD systems

· Can leave activity open

Sometimes it doesn't make sense to close the activity. When that's the case, just make sure it has appropriate notes before submitting the task to YSSU.
