drop-in recap – supporting taiohi into employment

whether its part-time or full-time, being work-ready is an important step towards independence

We know that for some of our young people obtaining employment will be the most appropriate option

The overall outcome of Youth Service is to ensure our young people have an achievable plan for employment, further education, or training on exiting the Service.

Steps you can take:

- 1. identify the young person's needs and make a plan for how to achieve them
- 2. understand the current skills the young person has and the types of roles and industries they can be transferred to check out <u>CareerQuest</u> to explore jobs and <u>skill matcher</u> to see what industries might suit their skills.
- 3. discuss any barriers they may need to address. for example employers' expectations, how to find a job and keep it, building confidence
- support the young person to undertake activities that will help them get a job.
 this could be writing a CV, interview skills, getting a driver licence to help them
 get work-related skills.
- 5. identify any <u>employment assistance</u> they might be able to get to help them enter the workforce like <u>Programme Fund</u>


Qualification Details

NZQA results are now available. Now is the time to add the results for taiohi who are currently enrolled or have exited within the last three months and have completed an NCEA qualification.

To do this, in ART go to the young person's **Details > Education tab**.

Enter the Qualification details:

- Choose a Qualification level
- 2. Enter the Activity Provider name
- 3. Enter the Final Assessment date (the date of the last internal or external assessment)
- Attach the Qualification Certificate
- Click on the 'Update Client' button.




transition to working age benefits

the youth service satisfaction survey was sent out this week


This week we sent out a satisfaction survey to our taiohi across the motu.
