the access and choice programme

this programme provides free mental health and wellbeing support services without referrals



The Access & Choice programme (from Te Whatu Ora Health New Zealand) bridges a critical gap in the mental health system, making it faster and easier for people to get the help they need.

It's doing this by putting mental health and addiction specialists in many GP practices, so people can get support during their visit. It also works with non-government organisations and local services to offer tailored support for different needs.

You can filter services by Youth, Kaupapa Māori, Pacific-led and GP. There is also information about rural wellbeing support and helpful links to wellbeing resources.

Young people don't need a referral or to meet specific criteria to access this free support.

🧢 call for help – celebrating te wiki o te reo māori 🠎




we're looking for people who are keen to host (or cohost) a session to celebrate te reo māori!

changes last year

- improvements to <u>housing support products</u>
- <u>supplier standards</u> that detail the level of service that needs to be provided
- fast-track public housing for young parents
- the emergency housing application process

emergency housing key points

- up to one week grants
- need to set activities that support the young person to find sustainable housing from the second week
- taiohi need to pay the emergency housing contribution








updated youth service provider map

Taiaoka – Please


Ko rabwa (singular) Kam rabwa (plural) – Thank you
