



deep dive: emergency housing improvements

from 14 August, we'll start launching some emergency housing (EH) improvements

Remember: emergency housing is a **last resort** when there are **no other options**You must consider staying with friends or other family, short term accommodation like hostels, and
Transitional Housing **before** you consider emergency housing.

1. Supplier standards for EH suppliers

These set out our minimum expectations of EH suppliers around safety and suitability, including that people staying in EH get the same level of service as any other paying customer. We'll publish the standards in August, and from November we'll only grant EH Special Needs Grants (SNGs) to suppliers who have opted into them (except for some limited circumstances – we'll send you guidance on this when it's available). MSD regional housing managers will be working with EH suppliers from August.

2. Guide for people in emergency housing

This short guide will tell taiohi the key things they need to know while they're in EH. It'll outline what they can expect from MSD and from their accommodation supplier, what's expected of them, and their rights while staying in EH.

3. Resolution framework

This will support YSSU on when to consider declining an EH SNG or make it recoverable, and when to escalate decisions. It can be used at the time of an EH SNG application - when the taiohi has contributed to their housing need, not followed the rules, or shown anti-social behaviour while in EH. We'll share this via ART when it's ready.

4. Updated operational guidance

We're updating our EH guidance in MAP so it's clearer when we'll consider declining, or make payments recoverable.





mental health services for youth in tertiary study

mental health and addiction services for all students at tertiary education institutions

As part of the Budget 2020 Student and Educator Wellbeing package, funding was allocated to expand mental health and wellbeing supports for tertiary education students.

The Tertiary Student Wellbeing initiative extends access to primary mental health and addiction services for students enrolled at all tertiary education institutions. The Services provide support to students who are experiencing mild to moderate mental health and addiction needs, but don't meet the criteria for specialist mental health services.

There's services in place at all universities and at 16 Te Pükenga business divisions and more continue to roll out to Work-Based Learning subsidiaries. Services are expected to commence at the Wānanga over the coming months.

What you can do to support taiohi moving into tertiary education

- Find out what support is available at their tertiary education institution
- Make sure taiohi know how to access this support
- Offer to provide a warm-handshake for the young person if they want connect with the primary mental health and addiction services at their tertiary education institution
