emergency housing – new end to end process

On Monday 2 October, the new Youth Service Housing end-to-end process will be implemented

What's new – every Youth Service provider will have a nominated housing contact, who will:

- be the primary contact with MSD's Regional Housing Manager
- work jointly with the Youth coach to ensure young people are placed into suitable emergency housing and connected to other housing services
- must contact MSD's Manager Regional Housing to discuss suitable housing options and record the conversation in the young person's file when a young person in their service needs emergency housing

Civil Defence payments

Civil Defence payments have been activated for Southland, Fiordland, Invercargill, Gore and Queenstown

These are available for taiohi and Youth Coaches who are affected by the flooding.

A Civil Defence Payment can help with:

- emergency food, clothing and bedding if it has been damaged or destroyed by the event
- costs if they have to leave their home
- loss of income because they can't work due to the event
- a payment if they have evacuees staying with them in places such as a private home, marae or community centres.

spring clean of tasks sitting on your dashboard


Help yourself by clearing the tasks on your dashboard before the system changes this Monday


youth service application process guide

family violence awareness series, Breaking Silence


new season available free-to-air now

Breaking Silence focuses on raising awareness of family violence in Aotearoa New Zealand and shedding the secrecy that often surrounds violence in the home.

Simonne Butler, a survivor of intimate partner violence and author, hosts the series. Series 3 investigates the impacts of the Family Court in the context of women escaping violence and the Hague Convention. It also shares inspirational stories from survivors like Fiona Southorn, whose incredible journey goes from childhood trauma, toxic relationships, and financial abuse to becoming a medallist at the 2012 Paralympic Games in London.
