Child Support Pass On

From 1 July 2023, there are a number of changes happening around child support payments.

Currently, sole parents who apply for a benefit must apply for child support payments through Inland Revenue (IR).

When they apply for child support payments through IR:

- the Government keeps the payment (up to an amount that's equal to their benefit payment)
- IR passes on any excess amount to the young parent, and
- the excess amount they get is only counted as income for some types of payments.

What's changing from 1 July 2023

From 1 July 2023, sole parents who apply for a benefit won't have to apply for child support payments through IR. However, they still can if you want to. Or you can choose to either:

- · end an existing arrangement through IR
- have another child support arrangement, e.g. a private arrangement, or
- have no arrangement at all.

If the young parent choose to apply for child support payments through IR, or they're already getting these:

- IR will pass on the full amount of these child support payments to the young parent.
- the amount paid to the young parent will be counted as income for their benefit and most other payments they get from MSD.





Child Support Pass On (continued)

From 1 July 2023, there are a number of changes happening around child support payments.

Young Parent Payment sole parents

From 1 July 2023, the child support payments will be treated as income.

If the child support payments takes the young parents total income over the upper income limit of \$308.08, their benefit will continue to be reduced by one dollar for every dollar. We'll keep paying their benefit until it reaches a point their no longer entitled to it.

NOTE: There is no change to the wage upper income limit of \$308.08. i.e. if the young parent is working and earns over \$308.08, their benefit payments will stop.

Drop in recap – all about notes

Good notes should be easy for someone else to understand, and detailed enough to see how you reached your recommendation.

The three Rs

- 1. Record factual account of a young persons situation
- 2. Relevant to the young persons situation
- 3. Readable to another youth coach and YSSU staff


You should record:

- Information about your engagement with the client
 - All evidence you've sighted
 - Information confirmed verbally
- All details relating to one event in the same note
 - e.g. add to an existing note if applicable
 - but don't add information to a closed task instead open a new task
- Include full information
 - for example, for SNGs if not meeting face-to-face why not (should be exceptional circumstances), what's going on with the young person, what's changed this week, what options have you both considered

· Keep notes objective and fact based, i.e. don't add anything you wouldn't want a third party to see
